A productive day on Saturday featured an **AAUW Educa-**

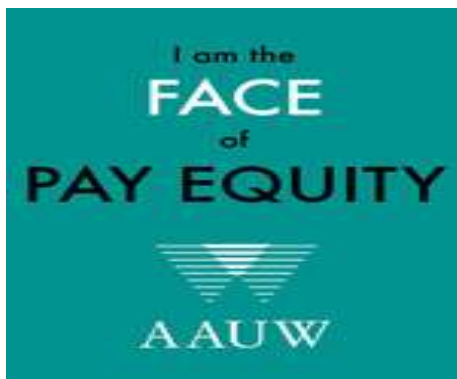

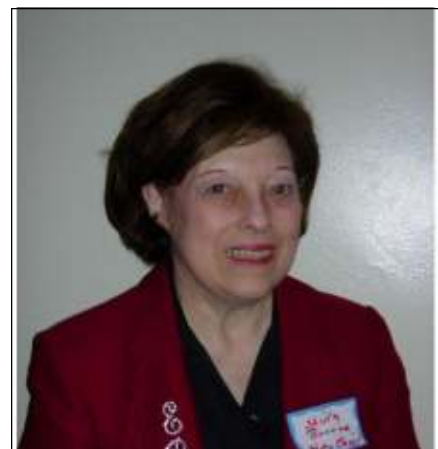
Be sure to obtain your copy of *Why So Few*, the new ground-breaking research recently released by AAUW. It is getting good press coverage. Make it available to your branch members

\$tart \$mart Workshop trains 7 more facilitators in Oklahoma

The \$tart \$mart campus initiative is a collaboration between AAUW and the WAGE Project, developed to empower young women who are college juniors and seniors and provide them with the tools to negotiate salaries and benefits as they approach the job market. It includes \$tart \$mart salary negotiation workshops for students and \$tart \$mart facilitator workshops that train facilitators to expand the program. The stated goal is to spread the program to 500 colleges and universities over the next three years, with the help of AAUW members.

AAUW/OK was able to organize the April 9th training for \$tart \$mart Facilitators. We now have individuals who are willing to take the \$tart \$mart workshop information to Northwestern OK State University (Alva), Northeastern State University (Tahlequah), Tulsa University, Oral Roberts University, and Tulsa Community College campus locations (Tulsa), the University of Central Oklahoma (Edmond), Oklahoma City Community College, and many more campus settings if the requests are made. As a branch community service effort, I would encourage you to take on the project of working to bring this information to students near you. The schools have some costs

How can you be part of the Solution? **INDIVIDUAL ACTION PLANS** from the Incarceration of Oklahoma Women – Solutions Initiative Summit (OK SIS)

Report by Faye Henson

A year of productive collaboration between many individuals, organizations and agencies in Oklahoma has resulted in recommendations from a Blue Ribbon Evaluation Committee. On April 30, 2010, the OK SIS participants approved a Public Agenda Action Plan that included items for state-level, community-level, and individual-level action. The **GOAL** of the summit was to “reduce the incarceration rate of Oklahoma women to under the national average by 2020 using evidence-based practice and policy. The summit dealt with three areas that could be addressed to affect the rate at which Oklahoma sends women to prison. I have listed the suggested actions that you can do as an individual to make a difference in this area. The initiatives all call for action to Education, Advocate, and Volunteer – which resonates with the AAUW Mission statement. Suggested approaches are mentioned, and there are others you may identify.

Prevention: Strategies to reduce common pathways and factors that can contribute to later incarceration.

- Educate, advocate and volunteer
- Volunteer at a school to tutor math
- Volunteer with the Girl Scouts
- Volunteer with your faith-based organization’s youth group
- Join a civic club with an interest in youth
- Join a group that is interested in mentoring young girls and teens
- Volunteer with an after school program
- Volunteer with the local Literacy Council
- Volunteer to be a Big Sister
- Assist the local library with reading hour
- Raise funds for child abuse prevention
- Mentor an “at-risk” girl

Volunteer with a safety-net organization that makes referrals and assists with health/social services

Intervention and Diversion: Strategies to intervene and address risk factors both before and after contact with law enforcement and/or strategies to divert low-

-risk nonviolent offenders from incarceration.

- Educate, advocate and volunteer
- Volunteer with the local mental health or substance abuse advocacy/treatment/support group
- Work with businesses to gain employment for offenders
- Educate those in your family, neighborhood, faith-based organization, social circle or professional circle about intervention and redirection
- Raise funds for organizations that serve “at-risk” populations
- Work with faith-based organization in drug, mental health or credit counseling programs
- Mentor a young woman who is at risk of incarceration

Volunteer with a nonprofit credit/financial counseling service

Recidivism and Reentry: Strategies that support rehabilitation of offenders, reduce recidivism and enable offenders to successfully reenter the community after imprisonment.

- Educate, advocate and volunteer
- Tutor a reentering woman who is working toward her GED
- Support nonprofits that provide safe housing for women offenders returning to the community
- Start a child care program in your faith-based organization for children of formerly incarcerated moms.
- Donate bus passes to organizations that serve reentering women offenders
- Volunteer/raise funds for faith-based groups working in prison ministry
- Volunteer/raise funds for nonprofit organizations with a prison program
- Volunteer with local nonprofits to assist women who have been incarcerated with the necessities for reentry.

Encourage business to employ woman offenders with appropriate skills/knowledge returning to the community

The full report will be issued in official form, but as the AAUW/OK representative to the conference, I have shared the **INDIVIDUAL ACTION PLANS** for each area. These are ways that we can invest in women in our state and make a direct difference in the lives of a person. If we can stop the cycle of incarceration that exists in families, offer hope and support to an individual (as a child or an adult), and provide ways for a return to productive life, then we will have helped break down barriers that have existed for too long in our state.

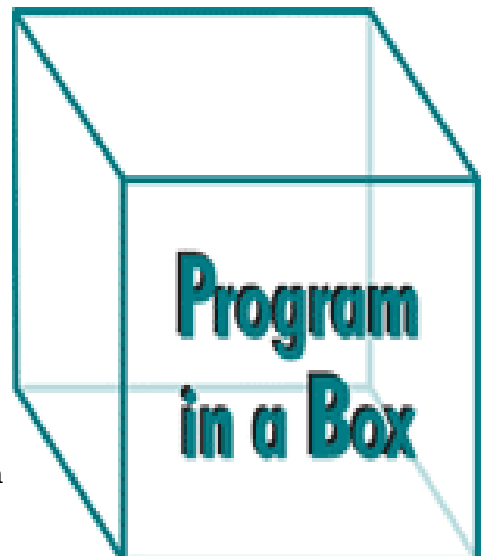
